Variation of Independent Water Networks Limited's appointment to include Seafield Road, Portchester

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On 27 May 2022, Ofwat began a [consultation](#) on a proposal to vary Independent Water Networks Limited's ("Independent Water Networks") appointment to become the water supplier for a development in Portsmouth Water Limited's ("Portsmouth Water") water supply area called Seafield Road, Portchester ("the Site"). Details of the application and our assessment of it were set out in the consultation document.

The consultation ended on 27 June 2022. During the consultation period, we received representations from two organisations, which are summarised in Section 1 of this document.

We will only make an appointment or variation if our assessment concludes that the application meets the criterion it has been made under; that customers or future customers on the Site will be no worse off than if the Site had been served by the existing appointee; and if the applicant will be able to finance the proper carrying out of its functions as a water and/or sewerage company. As set out in our consultation we are satisfied this is the case. The responses we have received to the consultation have not changed that view.

Having assessed Independent Water Networks' application and having taken account of the responses we received to our consultation, we decided to grant a variation to Independent Water Networks' area of appointment to allow it to serve the Site for water services. This appointment became effective on 12 July 2022.

The Site Map for the variation can be found in Section 2 of this document.

The Variation Notice legally making the variation can be found in Section 3 of this document.

1. Responses received to the consultation

We received responses to our consultation from two organisations: the Consumer Council for Water (“**CCW**”) and Environment Agency. We considered these responses before making the decision to vary Independent Water Networks' appointment.

The Environment Agency had no comments to make with regard to this consultation and did not have any objections. Details of the CCW's response are set out below.

CCW response

CCW states that in general it expects new appointment and variation appointees (“**NAVs**”) to match or ideally better the incumbent's prices, service levels and service agreements. This is particularly true for developments that include domestic housing, as household customers do not currently have the ability to choose or switch supplier like business customers can.

CCW noted that Independent Water Networks proposes to charge customers on the same basis as Portsmouth Water. It is disappointed that there will be no formal financial benefits for customers from having Independent Water Networks as their provider instead of Portsmouth Water. However, CCW notes that Independent Water Networks currently offers a discount of 2.5% against Portsmouth Water's charges and is offering a discount to those customers who are able to and opt to take up e-billing or pay by direct debit. CCW stated that therefore customers will be no worse off in terms of the amount they pay and potentially better off than if Portsmouth Water were to serve the Site.

CCW considers that Independent Water Networks generally matches or exceeds Portsmouth Water's level of service and so overall supports the application. However, CCW notes that due to the relatively small size of its customer base Independent Water Networks does not currently offer its financially vulnerable customers a social tariff in the way that Portsmouth Water does, although it will offer the standard WaterSure tariff for qualifying customers. Until it can provide a formal social tariff, CCW considers that it is appropriate that Independent Water Networks tailors some of the services it provides. CCW sets out its expectation that Independent Water Networks would offer appropriate, flexible support to any customer in financial difficulty who would otherwise have benefitted from a social tariff and that this should not be at the expense of its other customers. CCW recognises that by matching Portsmouth Water's charges Independent Water Networks already benefits from the cross-subsidy Portsmouth Water's customers pay to support its social tariff.

CCW notes our estimate that there will be no financial impact on the annual water bills of Portsmouth Water's existing customers if we grant this variation. CCW appreciates this but states that it is unclear whether there will be any significant benefits from the arrangement

for the incumbents' customers. CCW questions the value of the NAV regime if it cannot deliver benefits to all customers.

Our response

One of our key policies in relation to new appointments and variations, is that customers should be no worse off if a new appointment and variation is granted. That is, an applicant must ensure its new customers are made no worse off in terms of charges and service than if they had been supplied by the previous appointee. We do not require applicants to better the service and price of the previous incumbent.

Vulnerable customers may not be aware of the social tariff that would be available to them if they were served by the incumbent rather than by the applicant. It is the responsibility of the applicant to identify and protect vulnerable customers on the Site. Although the applicant does not offer a social tariff, it should ensure customers will be no worse off.

WATER SERVICES REGULATION AUTHORITY
WATER INDUSTRY ACT 1991, SECTIONS 6 TO 9

Variation of the Appointments of Independent Water Networks Limited and Portsmouth Water Limited as Water Undertakers

Made on 11 July 2022

Coming into effect on 12 July 2022

1. Independent Water Networks Limited ("Independent Water Networks") and Portsmouth Water Limited ("Portsmouth Water") hold Appointments as water undertakers for their respective areas ("the Appointments").¹ The areas to which the Appointments of Independent Water Networks and Portsmouth Water as water undertakers relate ("Water Supply Area") are set out in their Instruments of Appointment.
2. The site called Seafield Road, Portchester in Portsmouth, which is shown edged in red on the plan attached to this variation, ("the Site") is within Portsmouth Water's Water Supply Area. The Site is being developed by Hampshire Homes Limited.
3. Independent Water Networks has applied under section 7(4)(b) of the Water Industry Act 1991 ("the Act") for a variation of its Appointment as a water undertaker to include the Site and for a consequential variation of Portsmouth Water's and Appointment to exclude the Site.
4. On 27 June 1995, the Secretary of State for the Environment and the Secretary of State for Wales acting jointly and pursuant to sections 6(1) and 7(2) of the Act authorised the Director General of Water Services² to make variations such as those contained in paragraph 5 below. After public consultation, as required by section 8 of the Act, the Water Services Regulation Authority has decided that it should grant Independent Water Networks' application.
5. Therefore, as provided by sections 7(2) and 7(4)(b) of the Act, and with the agreement of Hampshire Homes Limited, the Water Services Regulation Authority **varies**—

(a) the Appointment of Independent Water Networks as a water undertaker so that the Site is included in Independent Water Networks' Water Supply Area; and

(b) the Appointment of Portsmouth Water as a water undertaker so that the Site is excluded from Portsmouth Water's Water Supply Area.
