Variation of Leep Networks (Water) Limited's appointment to include Dunstall Farm, Moreton-in-Marsh

On 19 July 2022, Ofwat began a <u>consultation</u> on a proposal to vary Leep Networks (Water) Limited's ("Leep Water") appointment to become the water and sewerage services provider for a development in Thames Water Utilities Limited's ("Thames Water") water supply and sewerage services area called Dunstall Farm, Moreton-in-Marsh in Gloucestershire ("the Site"). Details of the application and our assessment of it were set out in the consultation document.

The consultation ended on 18 August 2022. During the consultation period, we received a representation from one organisation. All comments received as part of our engagement during the application process are summarised in Section 1 of this document.

We will only make an appointment or variation if our assessment concludes that the application meets the criterion it has been made under; that customers or future customers on the site will be no worse off than if the site had been served by the existing appointee; and if the applicant will be able to finance the proper carrying out of its functions as a water and/or sewerage company. As set out in our consultation we are satisfied this is the case. The responses we have received to the consultation have not changed that view.

Having assessed Leep Water's application and having taken account of the responses we received to our consultation, we decided to grant a variation to Leep Water's area of appointment to allow it to serve the Site for water and sewerage services. This appointment became effective on 19 January 2024.

The variation notice legally making the variation can be found in Section 3 of this document.

1. Responses received to the consultation

We received a response to our consultation from the Environment Agency. It had no comments to make with regard to this consultation and did not have any objections.

The Drinking Water Inspectorate ("**DWI**") has stated that it is satisfied that Leep Water understands the obligations under the Water Industry Act 1991 (as amended), the Water Supply (Water Quality) Regulations 2016 (as amended) and the Water Industry (Suppliers' Information) Direction 2021. The DWI therefore raises no comments or objections to Ofwat proceeding to decision for applications submitted by Leep Water.

As part of the application process Ofwat has engaged with the Consumer Council for Water ("**CCW**"). CCW's position is that NAVs should bring benefits to customers on the proposed NAV site. CCW expects NAV Appointees to provide consumers with prices, levels of service or service guarantees that match or, ideally, better those of incumbent water and/or sewerage companies. CCW has stated that it is satisfied that Leep Water, as an established NAV Appointee, offers customers on its NAV sites prices and levels of service which match or better those offered by the incumbent water and/or sewerage companies which would otherwise serve the site. CCW agrees with Ofwat's assessment that customers on the Site will be no worse off if served by Leep Water and so, overall, supports the proposed variation of appointment.

CCW recognises that due to the small size of Leep Water's customer base, it does not currently offer its financially vulnerable customers a social tariff in the way that the incumbent companies do but does offer the standard WaterSure tariff for qualifying customers. CCW considers that it is appropriate for Leep Water to tailor the services it provides, until it can offer a formal social tariff, ensuring customers are provided with appropriate flexible support where needed. CCW is pleased to acknowledge Leep Water's commitment set out in its Household Charges Scheme 2023/24, that where a customer requests that Leep Water consider their particular financial circumstances, it will seek to match the level of service provide by the relevant incumbent company.

CCW notes that it is important for the NAV regime to have wider benefits for all customers, including those of incumbents, particularly as the number of sites in each incumbent area increases. CCW expects NAV companies and incumbent companies to work together to ensure the arrangements on the site and bulk charges are reflective of the impact on an incumbent's existing customers.

Our response to CCW

One of our key policies with considering NAV applications is that customers should be no worse off if a NAV is granted. That is, an applicant must ensure its new customers are made no worse off in terms of charges and service than if they had been supplied by the previous


appointee. We do not require applicants to better the service and price of previous incumbents.

Vulnerable customers may not be aware of the social tariff that would be available to them if they were served by the incumbent rather than by the applicant. It is the responsibility of the applicant to identify and protect vulnerable customers on the Site. Although the applicant does not offer a social tariff, it should ensure customers will be no worse off.


We considered all responses before making the decision to vary Leep Water's appointment.

WATER SERVICES REGULATION AUTHORITY

WATER INDUSTRY ACT 1991, SECTIONS 6 TO 9

Variation of the Appointments of Leep Networks (Water) Limited and Thames Water Utilities Limited as Water and Sewerage Undertakers

Made on 18 January 2024

Coming into effect on 19 January 2024

- Leep Networks (Water) Limited ("Leep Water") and Thames Water Utilities Limited ("Thames Water") hold Appointments as water and sewerage undertakers for their respective areas ("the Appointments").¹ The areas to which the Appointments of Leep Water and Thames Water as water and sewerage undertakers relate ("Water Supply Area" and "Sewerage Services Area") are set out in their Instruments of Appointment.
- The site called Dunstall Farm, Moreton-in-Marsh in Gloucestershire which is shown edged in red on the plan attached to this variation ("the Site") is within Thames Water's Water Supply Area and Sewerage Services Area. The Site is being developed by Spitfire Bespoke Homes Limited.
- 3. Leep Water has applied under section 7(4)(b) of the Water Industry Act 1991 ("the Act") for a variation of its Appointment as a water and sewerage undertaker to include the Site and for a consequential variation of Thames Water's Appointment to exclude the Site.
- 4. On 27 June 1995, the Secretary of State for the Environment and the Secretary of State for Wales acting jointly and pursuant to sections 6(1) and 7(2) of the Act authorised the Director General of Water Services² to make variations such as those contained in paragraph 5 below. After public consultation, as required by section 8 of the Act, the Water Services Regulation Authority has decided that it should grant Leep Water's application.
- Therefore, as provided by sections 7(2) and 7(4)(b) of the Act, and with the agreement of Spitfire Bespoke Homes Limited, the Water Services Regulation Authority varies-

(a) the Appointment of Leep Water as a water and sewerage undertaker so that the Site is included in Leep Water's Water Supply Area and Sewerage Services Area; and

(b) the Appointment of Thames Water as a water and sewerage undertaker so that the Site is excluded from Thames Water's Water Supply Area and Sewerage Services Area.
